It is our ambition at East Huntspill Primary Academy that every child with SEND reaches their full potential and can make a successful transition into higher education, training, work and our community.

The staff, governors, pupils and parents **work together** to make East Huntspill school a **happy, welcoming place** where children can **achieve their full potential** and **develop as confident individuals**.

The Priory Learning Trust Aims

At The Priory Learning Trust (TPLT) we strive to ensure that **ALL** pupils are fully included in all aspects of school life. All children in our care including those identified as having 'Special Educational Needs and/or Disabilities' have a common entitlement to a broad and balanced curriculum which is accessible to them as individuals.

SEND Support

East Huntspill Primary Academy is a small rural primary school located in the village of East Huntspill, which is between the villages Woolavington and Mark, near Highbridge in Somerset. We have 77 children on role from EYFS through to Year 6. We have 3.5 mixed aged classes – Reception/Year 1, Year 2/3, Year 4/5/6 with year 6 class taught separately in the mornings. We also have a Little Learners (LL) pre-school on site, open five days a week, with 18 children.

Currently 12.9% of the school population (not including LL) have identified SEND needs. Our Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Co-ordinator (SENDCo) is Mrs Rachel Hine, east@thpa.thepit.org.uk. She is non class-based who works 2 days per week across two primaries within our MAT. In addition to this in each school we have a dedicated Learning Mentor to support pastoral needs, as well as a full-time Parent Family Support Advisor who works across all our Somerset MAT schools (x 7 primaries and 1 x secondary). Alongside the headteacher and deputy head in each school, they meet on a regular basis to discuss key children, support and next steps where applicable. This also includes children who are currently on the Graduated Response structure, who may progress onto the SEND register for each school.

Question	Response
<p>How does the school decide if my child needs extra help?</p>	<p>At East Huntspill Primary Academy, we strive to ensure that ALL pupils are fully included in all aspects of school life. All children in our care have an entitlement to a broad and balanced curriculum which is accessible to all as individuals irrespective of need.</p> <p>We aim to address the children's needs and support their development in the most appropriate way possible and celebrate effort as much as achievement.</p> <p>Communication between school and families is key in deciding if additional help (above and beyond universal provision) is needed. At school we have a clear graduated response procedure we work with families on to ensure all are heard and needs are identified and subsequently met.</p> <p>We identify pupils who need extra help through our ongoing assessment process, through our observations, discussions between the class teacher and SENDCO and parent carers.</p>
<p>What should I do if I think my child has Special Educational Needs?</p>	<p>In the first instance, please talk to your child's class teacher. Communication between school and families is key. We have a clear graduated response procedure we work with families on to ensure all are heard and needs are identified and subsequently met. This procedure will be 'walked and talked' through with families at every stage.</p> <p>You may also be asked to complete a 'Quick Checker' to identify your areas of concern that you have to support your discussion with your child's class teacher.</p>
<p>How will the school consult with me and how can I be involved in planning their support?</p>	<p>When a teacher has concerns about your child they will initially begin an assess, plan, do, review record. As a part of this record parent carer views are recorded and the teacher will discuss what strategies they are going to 'do' with your child. They will then review this with you so you will know how your child is progressing.</p> <p>If your child is on the SEN register, class teachers and the SENDCO meet families on a regular basis (at least once a term) to review learning plans and work on next steps. This can be face to face, virtually or over the phone – whatever is most manageable and convenient for the families involved.</p> <p>If your child has an Education, Health and Care Plan you will also meet once a year to review this document, this meeting is called an annual review.</p> <p>Working together to support children is vital in ensuring needs are met both at home and at school.</p>
<p>How will my child be involved in planning the support they will have?</p>	<p>Children are at the heart of everything we do. Wherever and whenever possible the voice of the child is heard and we certainly involve them in their future planning.</p> <p>When the class teacher is completing the assess, plan, do, review record the teacher will be recording your child's voice.</p> <p>Where your child has a learning plan your child's voice will also be recorded in the document.</p>

	<p>Where your child has an Education, Health and Care Plan your child's voice is recorded as a part of the annual review document.</p> <p>We aim for a child to become as independent as possible, equipping them with tools and strategies for life.</p>
How do you know if my child is making progress?	We rigorously and robustly track the progress of our children so we can identify areas for development as well as successes. Staff meet regularly to monitor the progress of all the pupils in their class so that we can ensure all pupils are making progress.
How will I be aware of my child's progress?	Regular reporting of your child's progress will form part of the termly meetings, as well as a formalised Learning Review Meeting and whole school reports throughout the year.
How will the curriculum be matched to meet my child's needs?	<p>We adapt the curriculum to ensure it is accessible for your child irrespective of need. With continual monitoring of progress, we break the learning into smaller manageable steps that both school and home work together on to ensure key milestones are met.</p> <p>Teachers use the Somerset Graduated Response Tool to identify strategies to support removing the barriers for learning a child presents. Pupils with an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) have Individual Curriculum Plans which use the EHCP to match the curriculum the child's needs.</p>
How will information about my child's special educational needs or disability and the support they will need be communicated to staff?	<p>All teachers are teachers of SEND as a result all teachers are responsible for pupils with SEND in their class. The teachers at East Huntspill are actively involved in communicating the needs of all of the pupils in their class because they are usually the members of staff who initially raise the concern and know your child well.</p> <p>Any reports from outside agencies we receive are shared with the relevant members of staff working directly with your child.</p> <p>Where appropriate, the relevant staff members would be invited to any meetings being held on site where your child is being discussed. If this is not convenient then the minutes are shared with them.</p> <p>If your child has been identified as having SEND needs and on our SEND register they have a Learning Passport which can be accessed by any member of staff who is working with your child. The class teacher is responsible for ensuring it is up to date and regularly communicated.</p> <p>Where relevant, we will share your child's SEND information with other members of staff who will work with or potentially come into contact with your child.</p>
What training do teachers at East Huntspill receive about working with children with SEND?	Fortnightly training guides and links are communicated to all staff from our SENDCo. Key staff members will receive additional on and off-site training where requested (e.g. ASD support; Supporting Independent Learners; Dyslexia Guidance). Cross-MAT twilight hubs are dedicated to SEND learning and solution-focussed sessions. Wherever CPD is wanted and/or needed it is provided.
What support outside of the classroom could my child receive?	We have a strong pastoral support team at East Huntspill and if required support outside the classroom is given (sensory room time, Zones of Regulation work for example). However we try, as much as possible, for all children to be within their classroom to continue to build that all important sense of belonging with their peers.

What specialist services and expertise are available at or accessed by the school and how do you all work together?

At East Huntspill Primary Academy we work closely with specialist services such as

- Speech and Language
- Virtual School
- Autism Outreach
- Young Somerset
- CAMHS
- School Nursing
- Educational Psychology Service
- Somerset SENDIAS (Specialist Educational Needs and Disabilities Advisory Service)
- Occupational Therapy

to name a few.

If specialists services are required, the SENDCO will contact the relevant service and, where required, a (Team Around the Child) TAC is called with all agencies involved.

Communication is key in supporting the child from all perspectives.

<p>How will my child be included in activities outside the classroom including extracurricular clubs and school trips?</p>	<p>Due to the nature of the relationship between all involved in supporting children (including the child themselves) where possible every adaptation and differentiation will be made to ensure all activities outside the classroom (including trips) are inclusive of all children. Additional support maybe required from the families to ensure safety at all times, but strong communication, planning and thought goes into every decision made.</p>
<p>How accessible is the school environment?</p>	<p>Please refer to our school's Accessibility Plan for details.</p>
<p>How will the school prepare and support my child to join the school, transfer to a new setting/school/college or for the next stage of education and life?</p>	<p>Forward planning and communication is key in any transitional stage of a child's life. We work extremely closely with teams from all stakeholders to ensure a smooth, calm and successful transition is made. For example work will begin at the start of year 6 (early if needs be) to help prepare for secondary transition; this can include additional visits; enhanced transition; social stories etc.</p> <p>The SENDCO from Little Learners and The Primary School meet termly to ensure all information is shared and transitions are prepared for at the appropriate times.</p> <p>The child is at the heart of all decisions made.</p>
<p>If I am not happy with the support my child is getting, what should I do?</p>	<p>Come and talk to us about what we are not getting right for your child. In the first instance this should be with the class teacher. If the matter is not resolved the SENDCo will be involved; if still no resolution the Deputy Head and then Head Teacher will become actively involved. If the matter is still not resolved, the matter will be directed to our Chair of Community Council as set out in our Parental Complaints Procedure.</p>
